## CURRICULUM - WHAT DO WE DO AT SCHOOL

## Why we do what we do: Exploring real resources:

This week the children have gained so much from exploring pumpkin! Rich, hands-on learning experiences for children under five are valuable because they engage their senses and provoke curiosity. As they touch, smell, and even taste the pumpkin, our children strengthen their sensory processing skills and develop rich vocabulary. They can then describe textures, colours, and smells. Opening a pumpkin introduces them to basic scientific concepts, as they discover seeds and learn about plant life cycles. This exploration promotes fine motor skills as they scoop out seeds and handle tools, promoting coordination and muscle development. And finally our pumpkin exploration sparks creativity and encourages them to ask questions promoting an early love for learning and discovery.

## SUCCESS STORY OF THE WEEK!

Across Muriel Green, we've had a wonderful time exploring pumpkins in various ways—talking about their colours, textures, and sizes, playing imaginative games, and even making delicious pumpkin soup together. The children were fascinated as we cut open the pumpkins, scooped out the seeds, and discussed where pumpkins grow. This sensory activity allowed them to explore different textures and smells, sparking curiosity and conversation.









We've also been learning about Diwali, the festival of lights. The children enjoyed listening to stories about Diwali traditions and the significance of light in the celebrations. Some children took part in making Diva lamps out of clay, carefully moulding and decorating them to take home. Others created vibrant rangoli patterns with coloured sand and petals, learning about how these patterns are used to welcome guests and bring good fortune. Through these activities, the children are gaining an appreciation for cultural diversity and shared celebrations.
